

Joyce Daze Parade – August 5, 2023

Members of Peninsula Chapter of Back Country Horsemen of Washington took part in the Joyce Daze Parade on August 5th. Some members stayed for a two-day camp-out at the lovely Epona Ranch Campground, owned by member Margaret Salstrom. They set up portable corrals for their horses or used high-ties to trailers. Some riders trailered in each day.

The activities started with a "practice ride" through the metropolis of Joyce on Friday, August 4th to let the horses become accustomed to the surroundings they would experience on the "big day." Riders, Julie Kustura, Joan Wildman, Juelie Dalzell, Judy Sarles, and Sandy Ihly readied their horses at the ranch and then had a relaxed ride through town.

The day of the big parade, the riders were joined by Ben Wildman, pulling the chapter Tool Trailer which is emblazoned with the emblems of all of our "partner" agencies with whom we work to keep public lands and trails open to everyone (National Park Service, US Forest Service, Washington State Parks, Department of Natural Resources, Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe, Clallam County, Pacific Northwest Trail Association, Washington Trails Association, and Pacific Crest Trail Association). Linda Morin followed the unit with an electric lawn tractor and the job of "pooper scooper." A cheering crowd showed their appreciation for the opportunity to see the horses and Peninsula Chapter was awarded the "Blue Ribbon" for the best Animal Entry in the parade!

Following the parade, participants returned to Epona Ranch where Margaret Salstrom put on a big fish fry for friends and neighbors and everyone was treated to entertainment by local Cowboy Poet and Storyteller, Eric Tobin.

The only frightening event of the weekend was that one of the horses became tangled in his high-tie rope during the night. This is a reminder that "safety knots" can be pulled so tightly by the weight of a horse that they will not release as planned. A sharp knife was used to cut the rope and safely released the horse—but equestrians should **ALWAYS** have a **SHARP KNIFE** within easy reach for this kind of emergency! Carrying one on your belt when you ride and having one "taped" to the inside of your horse trailer door, within easy reach, are highly recommended.

Jamestown North -- Trail Work Sept. 28 & 29, 2023

Peninsula Chapter members built the Jamestown North Trail in 2019 to make a nice loop ride from the end of Cat Lake Road to the Miller Peninsula Trail system. The following year we built a connector across DNR land to give access to the ODT. There has been an area of the trail that gets quite muddy during the winter, so we used the motorized totes to raise the level of some low spots. Del Sage donated and loaded the gravel onto Jim Hollatz's flatbed trailer, then it was scooped into the totes and walked down the trail. Volunteers who helped on this project were Rick & Suzanne King, Joan Wildman, Tom Mix, and Jim & Donna Hollatz. We hope this work will make the trail more pleasant for bicycles and hikers.





Olympic Spirit Prize Ride -- September 9, 2023

Peninsula Chapter of Back County Horsemen of Washington held its annual "Olympic Spirit Prize Ride" on Saturday, September 9th, at Sage Horse Camp off Chicken Coop Road. This activity is the chapter's main fund raiser for the year. Funds are used for costs involved with doing trail work, providing youth and community education about equine pursuits, trail etiquette, and conservation, and for chapter business expenses.

Sequim and Port Angeles businesses providing sponsorships and prizes that totaled \$1,150 were: First Federal Bank, Cole's Jewelers, Sequim Co-Op Farm & Garden, Sound Equine, Mary Craft, Sound Community Bank, and Brown's Outdoor Store.

Sixty-four riders turned out with their horses to ride the trails. Most came from out of the area, with about 40 horse trailers camping Friday night, and some Saturday. A barbecue rib dinner was served to 50 people and over 60 prizes were available in exchange for raffle tickets.

The "ride" is about 8 miles/3 hours long and used a maze of DNR Roads and trails south of Hwy 101. Some new connecting trails were built this summer by chapter members, so less time was spent riding on "roads" and lovely new views were opened to riders. The weather was beautiful, and skies were clear to take advantage of the fantastic 360 degree vistas.

Chapter members donated many hours the day of the ride and in the months prior, organizing and executing this activity. A Trail Team (Theresa Percy, Juelie Dalzell, Anna Neal, Suzanne King, Judy Dupree, and Sara Campbell) rode and flagged the trail in the days ahead and before riders headed out Saturday morning. Sweep riders followed the group and removed flagging. The Prize Team (Judy Sarles, Linda Morin, Julie Kustura, Donna Hollatz, and Nancy Scott) procured prizes and arranged the display. The Registration Team (Stephanie Burns and Sandy Ihly) organized the paperwork and helped riders sign up, while Rick King managed the parking. A Snack Stop (Helen Shewman, Larry Sammons, and Jeff Chapman) was set up mid-ride to provide refreshments and water for riders and their mounts while they enjoyed the views. The Dinner Team (Kim Merrick, Joan Wildman, Julie Kustura, Nicole Witham, and Donna Hollatz) prepared and served dinner for 50 campers.

Many riders expressed their appreciation for the well-organized ride and are planning to return next September! In a follow-up survey, participants overwhelmingly gave "strongly agree" positive evaluations for all elements of the ride.

Youth Trail Campout -- September 30, 2023

Last spring Vice President Kim Merrick embarked on an ambitious plan for our chapter to host a Trail Clinic-Camp Out for Youth and their horses at Layton Hill. She was awarded a grant from BCHW to help fund the event and it was planned for May 6th with 14 youngsters signed up to participate and instructors lined up to teach 4 sessions to the kids: Riding Skills Needed on the Trail; Navigation of Trail Obstacles; Trail Clearing and Building; and Trail Safety on Shared Trails (3S).

Unfortunately, as the May date approached, we determined that the grounds at Layton Hill were much too wet, so the event was postponed and we looked for a new date that would accommodate riders and instructors. The schedules of most of the kids (who are involved with 4-H, Pony Club, Junior Rodeo, and family vacations) did not make it easy to find a date that worked for many kids.

We did have a group of 4 very enthusiastic riders, ages 10, 12, and 14, who were able to participate on Saturday, September 30. We were blessed with beautiful weather and the kids and their horses got a lot of individual attention because the classes were small. It was a great opportunity for our instructors to work the kinks out of the training and for seeing ways we can improve the program for next year.

Linda Morin and Julie Kustura taught the 3S Safety Program (Stop-Stand-Speak) which teaches safe interactions between user groups (hikers, bicycles, and equestrians) on shared trails.

Donna Hollatz and Joan Wildman instructed the group on the tools used to build trails, what to carry as a first aid kit, and how to cut obstacles back far enough for safe clearance. The kids were able to practice using a small trail pack saw, loppers, and clippers.

Arianne Raser, an instructor from Port Townsend, worked in the arena with the kids and their horses to help them learn safe trail riding skills; such as, proper following distance, being able to turn on the haunch and forehand, and riding with loose, relaxed reins.

Amanda Jackson, of Poulsbo, helped the riders and their mounts practice the obstacles at Sage Camp with great success for both kids and horses.

Theresa Percy, Stephanie Burns, and Suzanne King then led the mounted group on an actual trail ride through the Sage Camp property.

A campfire with s'mores completed the days activities. The families camped a second night and headed home on Sunday.

The plan is to do another Trail Camp for Youth next summer!

Please Report Trail Hazards on Website: www.pbchw.org
If you encounter downed trees or other trail hazards while riding, please report
them so our trail crews can address and correct the problem.

- Go to the website.
- Click on "contact"
- Give a description of the problem and where it is located. Be specific: date, which trail, approximately where along trail, size of tree or explain problem. Leave contact information if possible.

The website is monitored daily and this information will allow us to get the information to the necessary workers in a timely manner.

Trailhead Courtesy Reminder:

State Park personnel have complimented equestrians on the improved Parking Lot clean up, but everyone should be reminded to practice the **Leave No Trace** principles that we teach. Be sure to clean up any "deposits" you and your horses leave around your horse trailers or on the trails. If you cannot get your horse to move off the trail to "poop," dismount and kick the stuff off the trail (especially the ADA section at Miller). Walkers and bicycle riders will appreciate your courtesy! This includes shavings and hay in the parking area! Park rangers use a "blower" to clean the parking lot, and some of that stuff just won't move when damp! (**Do not comb winter hair from your mount and leave it in the parking area!**) We want to be sure that equestrians set a good example for other trail users.

We are working toward having accurate information regarding **Trailhead Parking** on our Website. **Please:** If you go to a trailhead, take a photo of your truck and trailer that shows the parking lot. Send those photos to me and also report any unsatisfactory road conditions or problems with stock rig maneuvering space. This will be very helpful to people planning trips. 
The fiscal year for Volunteer Hours is October 1 – September 30, so there has not been time to finish the computation for the past 2 months. That will be reported in the next publication.


