Frosty Moss Relay - April 1, 2023

Every year, Peninsula Chapter hosts an "exchange station" to support the Frosty Moss Relay. This is an 80mile relay/marathon held on the Olympic Adventure Route and Olympic Discovery Trail. It starts in the Sol Duc Valley and goes to 7 Cedars Casino. Runners come from all over the state to participate. It was planned for February 25, but postponed because of bad weather. We set up a wall tent, complete with wood stove, and had healthy snacks available to participants, who enjoyed the tent to get warmed up. Saturday was rather cold, with a hail storm, some sporadic heavy rain, and some times of sunshine! About a dozen chapter members were there to set up and take down the tent, serve refreshments, greet runners, check them in from the first leg of the relay, and cheer them on. Peninsula Adventure Sports donated \$250 to Peninsula Chapter for our efforts.


Trail Reports:

Miller Peninsula:

BCHW was asked by State Parks if we could assist with another WCC crew that was going to be working at the Park on March 20-23. In order to have the crew make the best use of their time, a Peninsula Chapter group (Jim & Donna Hollatz, Joan Wildman, and Rick & Suzanne King) spent the day of March 16 clearing large debris and removing it from the edges of Manzanita Trail so the WCC crew would be able to run brush cutters through the salal without hitting obstacles. The following week, Jim, Donna, Rick, and Tom Mix worked with the crew, continuing to clear hazard trees and other big stuff. The WCC workers did an excellent job of widening Manzanita and removing all the material that they cut away. You will certainly notice the difference next time you ride that trail!

Here are some pictures of a place where a tree had tipped over, taking a big section of the trail with the root wad. Once the tree was cut off, the root wad fell back into the hole and the trail was repaired!

Siebert Creek (North Olympic Land Trust):

A quick and easy sawyer project was done on March 27th at the western entrance to the trail near Old Olympic Highway. A dead alder tree was leaning over the trail and tangled up with some other trees. Jim and Donna walked in and cleaned up the mess in less than an hour. It would be pleasant if all the clean-up situations were that easy!

This is a handy little trail segment to ride from the ODT near Fox Bell Farm so it is important to keep it open for horses.





RCO Grant Application: In March it was announced that our grant application has received a preliminary ranking of #2 out of 36 applications. The final award will not happen for a few months, but the ranking is not likely to change. Jeff Chapman says this is the highest ranking he has ever seen a BCHW application receive. Our grant application was written by Denise Hupfer with input from our trail bosses, volunteer hours chair, and Jen Bond. Our chapter receives letters of support from most of the agencies that we partner with (DNR, NOLT, WA State Parks, ONF, and ONP) which are very valuable to our application. The grant amount of \$124,564 (and requires a match of \$256,562) is for a two-year period (2024-25). Having to meet the match requirement is the reason it is so important to keep track of our volunteer hours. Thank you to Denise for all her hard work on the Grant Application!

Peninsula Chapter Director's Report April 2023

BCHW held an in-person Directors' meeting in Ellensburg on Friday March 17th in conjunction with the annual BCHW Rendezvous that took place March 17th-19th. Directors from most all chapters were in attendance. At the beginning of the meeting, BCHW President Dana Chambers summarized the recent Executive Committee meeting during which their duties were discussed.

Dana also covered the BCHW website (bchw.org) setup and content. Most all documents dealing with BCHW and Chapter organization are posted on the site. There is a separate "Members Only" section where many of the documents can be located. She has strived to organize the files posted on the site in a logical fashion that can be located relatively easily (there are a lot of them).

The committee reports for the March State Directors' meeting are posted on the website in the Directors' section. Some samples of information from the reports:

There will be a BCHA Chairman letter for donations that will be coming to all members soon. The organization has not done any fundraising for the past year. Current thinking is that BCHA dues should be at the level to cover operational costs (which may possibly mean raising BCHA dues since they are 20,000 short).

Texas will officially join as a BCHA state at the National Board meeting in Kalispell April 2023. The BCHA Youth program's survey response reported 33 youth projects nationally, with 320 youth participating.

BCHA is continuing to develop "Light on the Land" as a proprietary equestrian leave-no-trace program. They have researched and received the ok to trademark LIGHT ON THE LAND. A preliminary outline has been created. This program will be targeted to stock use and is intended to be available to share with other equestrian organizations.

Finally, Peninsula Chapter and many others were unhappy with the Executive Committee (EC) passing a Policy that lowered the grant reimbursement for stock from \$100/day to \$75/day. At the State Board meeting, Larry Baysinger made a motion to raise the rate back to \$100, which we seconded. Bob Hoyle (Buckhorn Range), Larry (Mt Olympus), and I (Peninsula) then expressed why it was important to return the rate to what it was. The Board overwhelmingly voted to reverse the reduction and amend the policy back to \$100/day. This vote included some members on the Executive Committee who were themselves Chapter Directors. It is important to recognize that the EC itself is comprised in part by Chapter Directors.

If you encounter downed trees or other trail hazards while riding, please report them so our trail crews can address and correct the problem.

- Go to the website.
- Click on "contact"
- Give a description of the problem and where it is located. Be specific: date, which trail, approximately where along trail, size of tree or explain problem. Leave contact information if possible.

The website is monitored daily and this information will allow us to get the information to the necessary workers in a timely manner.




